Caribou represents the transfer of knowledge between generations. Each year the caribou trails deviate slightly to avoid predators. The older caribou lead the young ones, deviating the trails so that they will survive. Similarly, we change knowledge slightly to fit these complex times and navigate different trails so that our knowledge systems will survive.

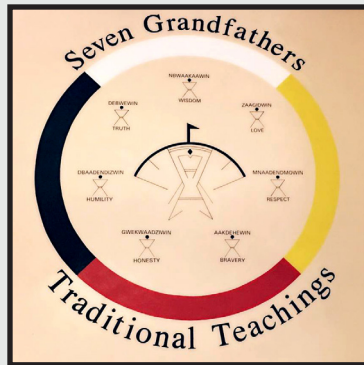


STATEMENT ON ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF TRADITIONAL LAND

We would like to acknowledge this sacred land on which the University of Toronto operates. It has been a site of human activity for 15,000 years. This land is the territory of the Huron-Wendat and Petun First Nations, the Seneca, and most recently, the Mississaugas of the Credit River. The territory was the subject of the Dish with One Spoon Wampum Belt Covenant, an agreement between the Iroquois Confederacy and Confederacy of the Ojibwe and allied nations to peaceably share and care for the resources around the Great Lakes. Today, the meeting place of Toronto is still the home to many Indigenous people from across Turtle Island, and we are grateful to have the opportunity to work in the community, on this territory.

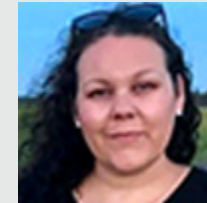

Frequently Asked Questions at First Nations House

Do you need to identify as Indigenous to use our services?

No. First Nations House provides culturally-relevant services to Indigenous students to support academic success, personal growth and leadership development.

FNH also provides learning opportunities for the larger U of T community to engage with Indigenous communities through Indigenous Education Week and other events, as well as the Elder and Traditional Teacher in Residence. The Resource Centre has over

3,000 books on Indigenous issues and can help guide your research in that area.

What services are available?

Indigenous specific grants, loans, and bursaries help can be found here. Emergency funding can be accessed in special cases.

A non-circulating resource centre has over 3,000 resources to help guide your research, and to help staff, students, and faculty connect to Indigenous events. First Nations House also hosts many cultural and social events, like the Indigenous Education Week, in addition to the Elder-In-Residence program.

Indigenous student life services can help with time management, planning, and essay writing.

First Nations House is welcome to all students, who want to engage with Indigenous learning, and it provides a home away from home for many students.

A computer lab is available, along with a tablet and a laptop.

All people who utilize First Nations House are expected to conduct themselves in accordance with respect and the teachings of our Grandmothers and Grandfathers.

What is an Elder?

Our Elders are community members who carry traditional (spiritual and cultural from their respective Nation) knowledge and help guide our people. Not every old person is an Elder. Traditional Knowledge Keepers also carry significant roles, and can assist you with questions of protocol and community, if asked out of respect. Helpers are people designated to assist our Elders and Knowledge Keepers.

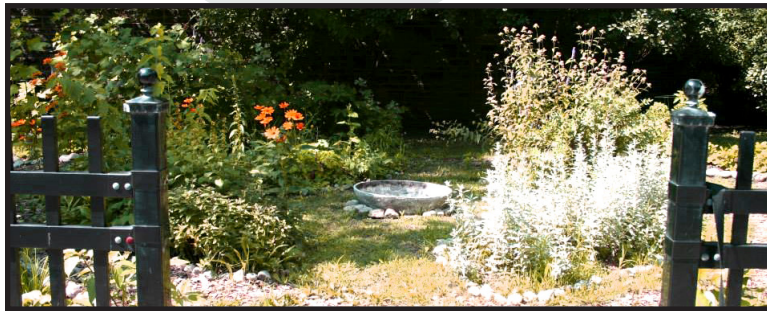

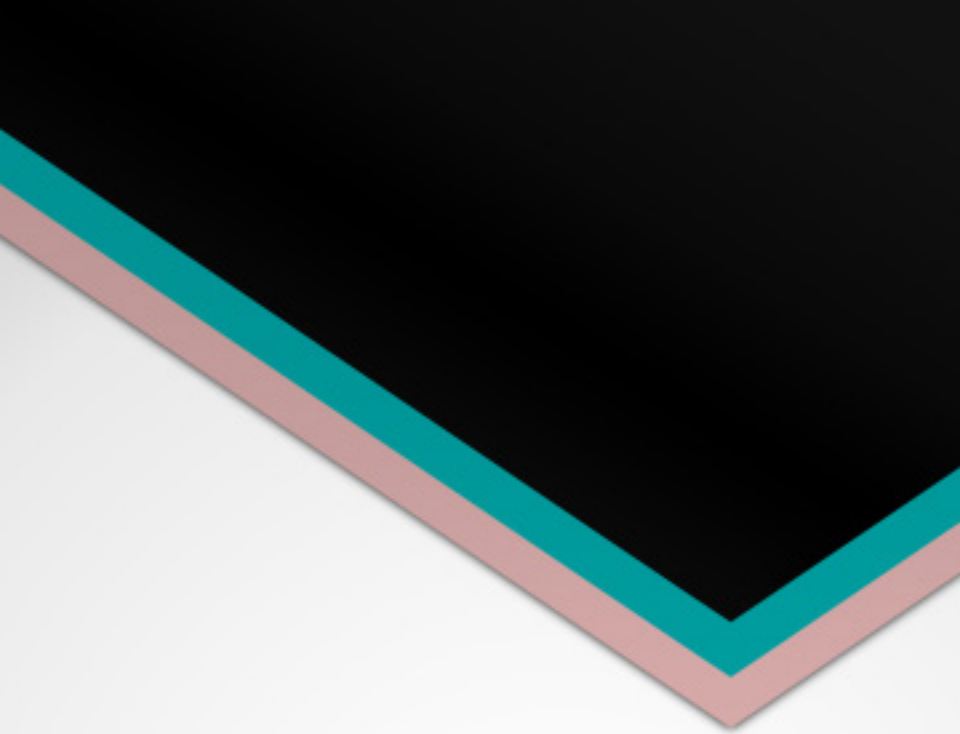
